The History of the Lake Worth Drainage District: Flood Control and Water Supply in Palm Beach County Monday, April 22, 2024 @ 7-8pm Eastern via Zoom

The **Lake Worth Drainage District** was created on June 15, 1915, under Chapter 6458 of the 1913 General Drainage Laws of Florida for the purposes of reclaiming, draining, and irrigating the lands within its boundary, providing water control and water supply, protecting the lands within its boundary from the effects of water by means of the construction and maintenance of canals, levees, pumping stations, and other works, and providing improvements for the purpose of making the area habitable for both settlement and agriculture.

The Lake Worth Drainage District has a rich history with the agricultural community. Though the agricultural production of early settlers was just enough to feed themselves, it marked the beginning of a booming industry that would grow into a billion-dollar economy providing Palm Beach County with the nickname *Winter Vegetable Capital of the US*. The western portion of the county, the "Glades," hosts nutrient-rich muck soil famous for its sugar and rice production. In the east, mostly in or near Boynton Beach, Delray Beach, Boca Raton, Wellington, and Jupiter, the sandy soil is excellent for growing vegetables and landscape vegetation.

Agriculture in our area today has expanded exponentially and our population continues to increase. Our speaker, **Tommy Strowd**, will tell how the plans made over 100 years ago formed a solid foundation for water management and continue to meet the new demands of these two diversified communities.

Robert H Rousseau - My Grandfather, My Mentor

Part II

From 2000 to 2003, John N. Suiter (1931-2008), son of Verna H. Rousseau (sixth of seven children, born in Boynton in 1907 to Robert H Rousseau (seated left, in the Family portrait) and Wilda Shipp-Rousseau (seated right, in the Family portrait)), wrote 36 short stories of life growing up in Palm Beach County beginning in the 1930s. The following is the second in the series; excerpted from one of his short stories.

In the spring of 1942, my grandparents, **Robert H Rousseau** and **Wilda Rae Shipp**, called us in West Palm Beach and told us a ship had been torpedoed straight off the Boynton inlet, less than one-half mile out. After school my mother, Verna Rousseau, drove my brothers (William and Robert Suiter) and me (John N. Suiter) down there. The ship was a southbound English ship and it had been sunk in such shallow water you couldn't tell it was sitting on the bottom. A boat captain named Jack Williams, who was a friend of my grandfather, had just come in through the inlet, was tying up his boat at the docks just south of the inlet when he heard the explosion of the torpedo. He threw off his lines and headed out the inlet to pick up survivors from the ship. Right after he cleared the mouth of the inlet, he felt his boat turning like it was in a whirlpool and the stern of the 36-foot craft was almost pulled under. He looked down and saw the conning tower of a German submarine right under him. The submarine had lay right off the mouth of the inlet waiting for its prey.

The ship's crew had been brought into the inlet by lifeboat and put into a pavilion on the south side where the present pavilion is located. Several of them had been killed. My grandparents were talking to them about their experiences. Ships of several nations were torpedoed by German submarines between Miami and Daytona during World War II, many of them at night. The entire coast was on a "brown out" meaning little or no lights along the coast. Even car lights were covered with black except for a slit. Black curtains were over all windows. All streetlights and advertising signs were extinguished. The Coast Guard had men on horseback patrolling the beach and wooden lookout towers every few miles. This was all part of the war effort.

Buried in Palm Beach Memorial Park off Seacrest Blvd in Lantana: D Suiter's great uncle C. Sam Faust and great aunt Alice Faust (Alice is Verna Rousseau's sister and D Suiter's grandma); Ivan Rousseau; Paul D. and Verna Suiter (the grandparents of D Suiter and John, Bill, and Bob Suiter's parents) and Bill's first wife Beth.
