# Marjory Stoneman Douglas and Rachel Carson: Their Books Changed the World Monday, March 25, 2024 @ 7-8pm Eastern via Zoom

**Rachel Carson**. Because of Rachel Carson's *Silent Spring*, we still have flora and fauna that would have been lost to DDT and other poisons in the environment back in the 1960s. Because of *The Everglades: River of Grass*, by Marjory Stoneman Douglas, we still have the only Everglades in the world. If there is time, Steinshouer will also touch a bit on **Connie May Fowler**'s *A Million Fragile Bones*, which brings "scribbling women" writing about the environment into this century, with Fowler's coverage of the effects on Florida's Gulf Coast from the Deepwater Horizon explosion in 2010.

**Betty Jean Steinshouer** is 35-year veteran of the Chautauqua circuit, touring 43 states and Canada since 1989, when she brought "Willa Cather Speaks" on a 10-city tour of Florida that March, with funding from the Florida Endowment for the Humanities, as it was known back then. In 2000, the editors of the History and Culture Series then being published by University Press of Florida, convinced her to begin a book on a dozen women authors who had important relationships with Florida over the years, adding Constance Fenimore Woolson, Rose Wilder Lane (Laura Ingalls Wilder's daughter), Edna St. Vincent Millay, Elizabeth Bishop, Anne Morrow Lindbergh, Rachel Carson, and Zora Neale Hurston. Most recently, she's made it a Baker's Dozen, adding Connie May Fowler. Steinshouer was named a Fellow in Florida Studies at the University of South Florida-St. Petersburg in 2004 and received the International Book Aware in Biography from BookFest for *Long Road from Red Cloud*, her book about Willa Cather, in 2020.

Robert H Rousseau - My Grandfather, My Mentor

Part I

From 2000 to 2003, **John N. Suiter** (1931-2008), son of Verna H. Rousseau (sixth of seven children, born in Boynton in 1907 to **Robert H Rousseau** and **Wilda Shipp-Rousseau**), wrote 36 short stories of life growing up in Palm Beach County beginning in the 1930s. The following is an excerpt from one of his short stories.

My grandfather, **Robert H Rousseau**, was born in north Florida in 1870. He was raised in that area and later in west central Florida around Clearwater and Tampa Bay. He worked as a drover during his teens, rounding up wild cows and driving them to market. He later married **Wilda Rae Shipp** in DeLand, circa 1892, and moved to Glenwood, which is a short distance north of DeLand in east central Florida, to raise citrus fruit. During the terrible freeze of 1895, which lasted for weeks, his orchards were wiped out, along with everybody else's trees and farms down to south of Lake Okeechobee. He tried again, but in 1899 he moved his family, including 2 children, south to a new farming community called Boynton. There were only about 40 people in Boynton at that time, all of them farming families.

Some families were farming pineapples, but he decided to farm beans, peppers, tomatoes, etc. since there was a local market that was shipping them by rail to markets in the northeast part of the country for fresh winter vegetables. He usually leased land for farming, since with a growing family he never got far enough ahead to buy it. At one time he leased the fertile land east of Spanish River, now the Intracoastal Waterway, in what is now the Town of Ocean Ridge and Town of Gulfstream. He had to lease easterly all the way to the ocean, including the sand ridge and the ocean beach. The ridge and the beach were considered wasted money because he couldn't grow anything in the sand.

**Verna Rousseau** and her son, **John Suiter**, and his wife, **Kathleen T** and their only daughter, **Kathryn M**, are buried in Palm Beach Memorial Park (off Seacrest Ave in Lantana); **Robert H Rousseau** is buried in Woodlawn Cemetery across from the Norton Museum of Art, West Palm Beach. His grave is on the right side, about the 3rd row inside the gate.

# **Doretha Keeps History Alive!**

The late **Alfred Hair**, the original Highwayman, was known as the heart of the Highwaymen artists. I believe his wife **Doretha Hair Truesdell**, could be known as the soul of the group. At each Highwaymen show that we have presented as the Boynton Beach Historical Society, she arrives early in the morning carrying her paintings with grace and gratitude. She continues to travel the road as a Florida Highwaywoman.

In her early twenties, Doretha helped Alfred paint blue skies and shorelines on Upson board. Alfred would then quickly brush in the wind-swept palm trees, Spanish moss, and other details. Doretha had the gift of hospitality and invited several young African American artists to join them to paint Florida landscapes together at their home on Dunbar Street in Fort Pierce during the 1960's. The music of **James Brown** on the radio would keep everybody moving at a good pace all night long. It was a time for laughter and a glorious time for creating art. Alfred's mentor, **A. E. Backus**, tried to get him to slow down, but he liked to paint fast. That way he could get the paintings out to sell quickly. Unable to display and show their work in galleries, they traveled the roads to sell their work to local business owners. This is how they came to be known as the "Highwaymen" artists. Carefully, Alfred and Doretha would put the wet paintings in the trunk of their car, and they would travel from Fort Pierce to Miami, stopping at small towns along the way to sell their paintings. The Alfred Hair painting that I have in my living room still has blue fingerprints from the wet paint on the back.

Boynton Beach was a favorite place to stop, with a growing population of 10,467 in 1960. In the South, there could be great prejudice and racial discrimination. Doretha says they were warmly greeted by people who liked their artwork. In the time of segregation, the paintings helped to break down barriers. In Boynton Beach, people loved the dreamy tropical scenes. **Steven's Drug Store** had paintings on display which decorated their store. These paintings were also for sale. **Harvey Oyer** collected paintings for his insurance agency office and even today the paintings are on display at the agency. Highwaymen art can be found today on the walls of the **Scobee-Combs-Bowden Funeral Home**. Alfred spread out his paintings in the lobby of **First Bank of Boynton Beach**. 1 asked Doretha, "How in the world would someone be allowed to set up paintings for sale in a bank lobby?" She replied, "They invited him in!" ALL the paintings were snapped up by customers and bank tellers. In a newspaper from 1969 the bank advertised, "Want to start the day right? Stop in and chat...you'll always find a friendly ear!" Alfred and Doretha certainly found a friendly ear.

When Doretha comes to Boynton Beach for our Highwaymen show, she is living Black History. Today, the paintings are treasured and highly collectible. She continues the journey of the Highwaymen legacy. **Girl Scouts of Southeast Florida Troop 24514** from **St. John Missionary Baptist Church** gathered around Doretha as she talked to them about the Highwaymen artists and how they had to overcome many obstacles in life. She encouraged the girls and asked, "Which of you would like to be an artist?" She told them to be strong and to always have faith and persevere.

When I look at the small painting by Doretha in my bookcase, I am reminded of her courage and her place in Florida history. The bright scarlet royal poinciana tree brings me immense joy.
