There are countless archives all around us, the majority of which are freely accessible to the public. **Jacob Rabinowitz's** goal with this presentation is to arm you with the knowledge to understand what they can do for you, and how you can better find and use these resources that archives & finding aids have available.

The presentation will be an overview of archival finding aids, the map, key, and legend of archival collections. It will additionally address the topics of archives as an institution & profession, how finding aids fit into the big picture, and demystify some myths & misconceptions about archives & archivists. Beyond addressing the concept and framework of archives, archivists, and archival finding aids, this presentation will guide us on how to use them with the aim of accessing archival materials for research, genealogy, or for just the plain curious!

Jacob Rabinowitz is the Librarian/Archivist at the Boynton Beach City Library Local History Archives. He holds a B.A. in Linguistics and a master's degree in Library Information Science with a focus on archives & preservation. Prior to his current position at Boynton Beach City Library, he worked as an archivist at San Jose State University's Special Collections & Archives. Outside of the archival world, Jacob enjoys playing sad waltzes on the accordion for his dog Luna.

The Andrews House Is Endangered and Needs YOUR Help

The oldest home still standing in Boynton Beach is the **Edith Andrews House**. It is located at 306 SE First Avenue, Boynton Beach, and is a vital piece of Boynton Beach's architectural and cultural heritage. Sadly, the Andrews House is facing potential demolition by its private owner and is seriously endangered.

The Andrews House is a significant example of early 20th-century frame vernacular architecture. It was built between 1901 and 1907 by **Bert L. Kapp** on land purchased from **Birdie** and **Fred Dewey** and, by 1913, had begun serving as a guest house. In 1924, Kapp sold the property to **Alice Fields**, who in turn sold it in 1925 to **Katie Gager Andrews** continuing operation as a guest house. It passed to her sons, **Charles Lee Andrews** and **George Kermit Andrews**, eventually being inherited by George's widow, **Edith Burns Andrews**. Restoration occurred between 1998 and 2000 when **Robert Katz** acquired the property. In May 1998, the house was relocated 40 feet east to a new concrete foundation and in 2000, opened as a pioneer museum (pictured above). Katz died unexpectedly in 2006, and the building ceased operating as a museum. It changed owners most recently in 2022.

There is growing concern for the safety of this precious piece of our history. Steps have been taken by the **Boynton Beach Historic Resources Preservation Board (HRPB)** to have this historic building added to the City of Boynton Beach's Local Register of Historic Places by Ordinance.

The **Historical Society** joins with the HRPB and urges our members and friends to reach out to Boynton Beach City Leaders and encourage the City to recognize the historical significance of the Andrews House and to work with its current owner to find a solution that will preserve this valuable part of our heritage. Please share this important message with your family and friends and ask everyone to email City Leaders and encourage them to save our history. Attend a City Commission meeting and express your concerns. We were successful in raising the alarm that led to saving the old high school from demolition which now serves as a hub of arts and cultural activities for the City. Let's do it again and **SAVE THE ANDREWS HOUSE**!

On the Gulf Stream

Growing up in Maryland, my family had a front yard with a sweet fragrant mimosa tree. Underneath the tree was an angel statue and a bird bath surrounded by plastic pink flamingos. The yard looked tropical with drooping branches and blooms like pink powder puffs. Maybe Florida looked something like this. My **Aunt June** would go to Florida each winter during the 1950s and bring me small boxes of seashells. She told me I would like Florida.

Many years later I would end up in Boynton Beach and she was living in Deerfield Beach. Her apartment in Washington D.C. was filled with sentimental Florida souvenirs and other whimsical objects from her trips. These items are now known as Florida kitsch. Kitsch is an early 20th century term from the German language and refers to objects and art that might be considered kooky and tacky like pink plastic flamingos. It might also include my Aunt June's pastel-colored flamingo print by **Turner**. I like the retro, airbrush style of the artwork. It was reasonably-priced art and was sold often in department stores and five-and-dime stores in the 1950's. Turner was not a specific artist, but a company out of Chicago that hired artists. They were mostly known for their tropical flamingos, parrots, and cranes.

A few years ago, at the West Palm Beach Antique Show, I bought a vintage Turner flamingo print from my friend known as The Antique Nomad, **George Higby**. The print had belonged to his late aunt, who had lived in St. Petersburg. For many years she kept it hanging in the hallway of her home. Today that print is displayed in my hallway. The flamingos are pictured wading in water in a mirror frame. It might be Florida kitsch, but it reminds me of my Aunt June and her stories about Florida. Whenever I look at those flamingos with their water-colored soft edges, I feel a sense of calmness and peace. Art is in the eye of the beholder, and this art is good for me.
